EXCITING NEWS FROM THE NEIGHBORHOOD BRIDGE!

We are on track to have an Executive Director of The Neighborhood Bridge in place by July 1.

The Executive Director is key to the success of the mission of The Neighborhood Bridge: to use the St. Catherine-St. Lucy campus as a base to serve individuals and families in the Austin community by connecting them to high-quality human services to help them thrive. The Board is in the

process of screening candidates and will be interviewing finalists in the coming weeks. We are gratified by the impressive number of well-qualified candidates who submitted resumes for the position. The Executive Director will be the face of the organization, interacting with Austin area schools, connecting school families and other Austin-area residents with the service providers active in the area to meet their needs.

We are planning on renovating the lower level of the rectory by August 15.

Initially, the lower level of the rectory will house adult education classes and a distribution center for needed supplies, as well as current ministries serving residents in the area. Future plans are to house the offices of The Neighborhood Bridge on the first floor.

We are visiting each of our five partner schools over the next month to discuss the launch of The Neighborhood Bridge.

Before The Neighborhood Bridge was established, volunteers reached out to five schools in the Austin neighborhood (St. Catherine-St. Lucy, St. Angela, Chicago Jesuit Academy, Catalyst Circle Rock, and Christ the King College Preparatory School) to learn firsthand what the critical unmet needs of their school families were. We'll be visiting each of these schools to update them on our progress and to finalize a communication plan for each one to keep their families informed about the resources available through The Neighborhood Bridge.

We are launching a Spring fundraising appeal to help The Neighborhood Bridge meet the goal of connecting Austin area residents with needed services by the start of the 2024-2025 school year.

MIGRANT MINISTRY UPDATE: Rejoice! He has risen! Alleluia!



Such joy we experience on Easter morning when once again we can use the "A" word – Alleluia.

My Spanish is limited to about 5 words and only one that I use regularly, "Hola". That is usually followed by "welcome" which our migrant families probably don't understand. Then a pause to look in their eyes and then they smile.

Those tired eyes, the weary bodies, and when we offer a simple breakfast, clean clothes and shoes, and some toys for the kids - then they smile.

Then the doctor is here today, the priest is here to talk with you, sit for a minute and tell us

what you need – then they smile.

We're looking for an apartment for you, please be patient, we will help get the kids in school, and find beds for you to sleep in – then they smile.

Alleluia – then they smile. It is here that we see the Living Christ, the face of Christ. The gratitude for the smallest gift is written in that smile. And we of course smile back.

Food For Thought Rejoice and be Glad!

"Jesus commissioned us to preach to the people, and testify that he is appointed by God as judge of the living and the dead. To him, all the prophets bear witness, that everyone who believes in him will receive forgiveness of sins through his name." (Acts 10:42-3)

Candy, clothes and church, the three-C's of Easter morn, comprised what that Holy Day meant: three boys could mourn the fasting rule that rendered candy un-attacked; But after morning mass, the treasury was sacked. Many years later, we participate in what's the new life of the risen Christ, whose majestic spirit and power provide meaning to our Christian world. Easter readings highlight three actions that need to happen in Christian lives.

> First, if we as Christians wish to become "Easter People," then we need to clear out the old yeast in our lives. 1Cor 5 focuses on yeast and dough, the festival of Unleavened Bread, celebrated at Passover, and linked to Easter and the Resurrection of Christ. As part of the Festival of Unleavened Bread we clear out the "old yeast" within us, transforming into Christ-like unleavened bread. *"This is the day the Lord has made; Let us rejoice and be glad." (Ps 118)*

Second, if we Christians wish to participate in Christ's resurrection, we have to "figuratively" shed our burial clothes. John's gospel tells us that, when Mary of Magdala, Simon Peter and the beloved disciple entered Jesus' tomb, they found only his burial clothes. As part of his rising, Jesus had become bright and vibrant. Are we, the living, ready to change our spiritual. clothes. and "put on Christ? *"Give thanks to the Lord, for he is good, for his mercy endures forever."*

Third, as "Easter People," we share in the gift of new life, Christ's resurrection. Just singing "alleluia" is not enough. In Acts 10, we're told that the Divine One anointed Jesus with the Spirit and the power to embrace and live his holy mission of healing, teaching and liberating those in need. We too are anointed with the Spirit, to do the work of Easter, welcoming the marginalized to embrace a healing love. *"The right hand of the Lord is exalted; I shall not die, but live, and declare the works of the Lord."*

St. Giles School Announces Strategic Partnership With Rose K. Goedert Center for Early Childhood Education

St. Giles is able to accommodate every 3-and 4-year old preschool student in the Goedert Center's current program who chooses to enroll for the 2024-25 school year.

2. **Expanded Resources:** By joining forces, St. Giles School will provide enhanced resources and facilities, fostering an even more enriching learning environment – all while maintaining its 10:1 student to teacher ratio. The school is adding a summer program for preschoolers to provide continued, year-round care. The summer preschool program will be available for registration beginning summer 2024.

3. **Expertise Integration:** Pending enrollment, the collaboration aims to integrate the expertise of educators from both institutions, combining their strengths to create an even more robust early childhood education program.

"We are thrilled to welcome the families and students of the Goedert Center for Early Childhood Education into the St. Giles School family," said Meg Bigane, principal at St. Giles School. "We've been looking to expand our preschool program and this partnership offers the perfect opportunity to do so. This is a testament to our shared values and dedication to providing the best possible educational experience for the children of Oak Park and its surrounding communities."

"When the decision to close the facility at Dominican University was made last year, it became critically important to me and to our faculty that we selected a partner that matches Goedert's beliefs, culture, and educational mission: a place where our families can easily and seamlessly transition and know their children will receive the same experience they do now," said Sarah Thomas, Director of the Goedert Center. "St. Giles is that place. Our programs are strikingly similar with educational philosophies that mirror one another. I know our students will feel the warmth and support of a loving community; I have already."

The integration of the Goedert Center into St. Giles School will be effective as of June 17, 2024. Both institutions are actively working to ensure a smooth transition and are excited about the positive impact this collaboration will have on its community of young learners.
