A Guide to Shawl Shapes and Sizes

Circle = 40 inches (102 cm)

(worn folded in half)

Square = 48 to 60 in (122 to 153 cm)

(folded to triangle or rectangle)

Triangle = 48 to 72 in (122 to 183 cm)

Rectangle = 72 to 80 in (183 to 206 cm) long

18 to 20 in (46 to 51 cm) wide

Wrap = 66 to 72 in (168 to 183 cm) long

24 to 30 in (61 to 77 cm) wide

Statistics for the Quarter

Who are We Praying for?

- A woman with a 25 year old adopted son dying of leukemia. He and his adopted sister had AIDS as infants but were treated and cleared of AIDS. Last year he was diagnosed with leukemia which went into remission. It came back a week before his mother was given the shawl. He died a few days after she received it.

- A prayer shawl was given to a woman whose son was detained by ICE. All his papers were received and they were waiting for a visa. The woman is providing for family members in her son's absence.

- One shawl went to a newlywed couple. You married people know why we pray for joyous occasions as well.

Vertical Lines Prayer Shawl

SIZE 19" x 65" (48cm x 165cm)

MATERIALS

Plymouth Hot Cakes: Color 6 Pastel Mix—2 cakes

Needle: US size 9 (5.5mm) 24" circular needle or size to obtain gauge

Notions: Two stitch markers

GAUGE 16 sts = 4" (10.2cm) in St st on US Size 9 needles.

ABBREVIATIONS: k = knit; p = purl; RS = right side; st(s) = stitch(es)

STITCH GUIDE Seed Stitch Pattern: Row 1: *(P1, k1); repeat from * to last st, end p1. Repeat Row 1 for all rows.

DIRECTIONS

Loosely cast on 79 sts.

Work 10 rows in Seed Stitch Pattern.

Begin body of blanket as follows:

Row 1 (RS): Work first 10 sts in Seed Stitch, place marker, knit across to last 10 sts, place marker, work last 10 sts in Seed Stitch.

Row 2: Work first 10 sts in Seed Stitch, slip marker, *(p4, k1); repeat from * to last 4 sts before next marker, p4, slip marker, work last 10 stitches in Seed Stitch.

Repeat Rows 1 and 2 until piece measures approximately 63" (160cm) from cast on edge, or desired length, ending with Row 2.

Work 10 rows Seed Stitch. Bind off loosely in seed stitch pattern. Weave in all ends.

An Easy Crochet Shawl

Required amount of yarn depends on yarn and hook size, usually 2 to 4 skeins

Start with magic ring (or chain 7, slip stitch to 1st ch st)

row 1 - ch 3, 4 dc, ch2, 5dc (you can now pull ring tight)

row 2 - Ch3, dc in first st (counts as 2 dc in first st), dc in each dc to center chain, (dc, ch2,dc) in center chain, dc in each dc to last st, 2 dc in ch3 from previous row

Repeat row 2 until triangular shawl is desired length.

Each row increases by 2 stitches on each side of center.

With chunky yarn and big hook, it works up very fast. Whatever size hook and yarn, it makes a fabric with soft drape and a warm hug.
