# Hopeful Prayer Shawl

Skill Level: Size: 20" x 60"

Materials: 1400 yards worsted weight yarn or 700 yards chunky weight yarn

Needles: US #13-24" circular needle

Notions: Right side marker, tapestry needle

Gauge: 12 stitches = 4" in garter stitch (knit every row) 10.75 stitches = 4" in pattern stitch

Abbreviations:

k = knit

k2tog = knit two stitches together by working two stitches instead of one

p = purl

ssk = slip the first stitch as if to knit, slip the second stitch as if to knit, then slide the left-hand needle into the front part of both stitches and knit them

together.

yo = yarn over, bring yarn to front as if to purl

Note: If you are using worsted weight yarn you will be double stranding the yarn throughout the pattern. If using chunky yarn you will be using it single stranded throughout the pattern.

The Pattern:

Cast on 54 stitches

Starting Border: Knit 10 rows

Row 1: k5, \*k2, p1, yo, ssk, p1; repeat from \* until 7 stitches left, k7 (placing marker on this row to denote right side of

prayer shawl)

Row 2: k5, \*p2, k1; repeat from \* until 4 stitches left, k4

Row 3: k5, \*k2, p1, k2tog, yo, p1; repeat from \* until 7 stitches left, k7

Row 4: k5, \*p2, k1; repeat from \* until 4 stitches left, k4

Repeat Rows 1-4 until prayer shawl measures around 58 inches from the cast on edge, after having just finished Row 4

Ending Border: Knit 10 rows

Finishing: Bind off





# **Knitting Litany**

Most agitated hands, be my salvation. Most restless eye, look only here. Most anxious heart, trust this singular fact: something can come of nothing. The miracle turns on every stitch: with every whispered row, leaves, waves, flowers and stars drop from my fingertips. In this, the crest of a wave, my heart rises up and drops as I roll the wave. Row after row I make the wave, rising and dropping stitch after stitch; there is no end to the waves, to the world in my hands: cockle shell, wolf's claw, wasp nest, bear's paw, apple leaf, lamb's lettuce, pine tree, gull wing, honeycomb, cloud and mountain, four sisters, frost flowers, summer fountain, hyacinth, sycamore, granite laurel, lynx eye, drooping elm, wheat germ, cakes and waffle, clover leaf, blue bell, bell rib, banana tree, ant egg, beehive, lady's lace and willow bed, per omnia sæcula sæculorum. These are the prayers I say these days. A simple co-creator, I trust in simple decorum. Wanting something to come of nothing, I make only slight demands: Let starfish, berries, and foxglove fall now from my hands.

### **Rock the Block Pattern**

What Size? First you need to decide what size of blanket you would like to make and make a note of the width and length.

What Pattern or How many Colors? Yep, you have to pick one of them. I know it can be difficult but decide if you want to use one color, 2 colors or more. Then decide if you want to make your blanket with a specific pattern (1 row repeats, 2 row repeats, random, etc.). Example pictured was done with two colors, changing on the odd rows.

## Begin your Project:

Crochet a foundation row in multiples of 4 sc until the desired width is reached.

R1: Ch 1, sc in next 3 sts, [ch 2, skip next 2 sts, sc in next 2 sts], repeat [] until 5 sts remain, ch 2, skip next 2 sts, sc in next 3 sts, turn

R2: Ch 4 (counts as hdc + ch 2), skip next 3 sts, [dc in next 2 skipped sts from 2 rows prior, ch 2, skip next 2 sts], repeat [] to last st, hdc in last st, turn Note: Dc in this and following rows will be worked around/over the chain sp of the prior row, ch sp will be covered by the dc.

R3: Ch 2 (counts as a hdc), dc in next 2 skipped sts from 2 rows prior, [ch 2, skip next 2 sts, dc in next 2 skipped sts from 2 rows prior], repeat [] to last st, hdc in 2nd ch of beg ch, turn

Repeat R2 & R3 until desired length is reached Final Row: Ch 1, sc in next 3 sts, [dc in next 2 skipped sts from 2 rows prior, sc in next 2 sts of current row], repeat [] to last st, sc in last st, fasten off and weave in all ends

When I'm reading, I put it on my lap.


I cover myself with it when I'm sleeping.
